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## 1. Updates

#### WorkSafe and Kāinga Ora partner on construction

WorkSafe and Kāinga Ora are working together towards a shared goal of brace sock outcomes for those involved in building and maintaining Kāinga Ora homes and communities.

In establishing this partnership, WorkSafe are seeking opportunities to de elop meir contextual understanding of the health, safety and wellbeing challenges through underesidential construction contracting supply chain. Our joint work programme will enable WorkSale to identify the interventions that could have the greatest impact on reducing harm in residently construction and maintenance, learn why some existing tools and resources are not being us of an understand how strong client leadership can deliver better outcomes for workers. Kāing t Oraciteseking to deliver on the WorkSafe priorities for publicly procured construction, contribute to the ving communities, and influence the supply chain through leading by example.

Kāinga Ora has incorporated WorkSafe's Maruith regional approach as part of our health and safety framework to support Māori in the construction industry which will allow us to work together in building on existing relationships with Iwi Māori and en bleva focus on equitable health, safety and wellbeing outcomes. Together we will trial innovative mays of improving health, safety and wellbeing in construction. This joint statement has also gene to the Minister for Workplace Relations and Safety.

#### Life-cycle assessment technolog

Earlier this year Kāi ga cra issued an RFP to source life cycle assessment technology to assess the carbon impact of our rew nomes at scale and pace. After a robust procurement process, we are pleased to advise tract bastralian based company eTool PTY Limited is our preferred supplier, with the contract being signe on 30 September 2022. Kāinga Ora and eTool have worked closely to identify the custor sation required to deliver a closer fit solution for the New Zealand environment and for Kāinga Ora trays of working.

Kāin a Ora will now focus on developing processes and training to align with eTool's approach with the ain of a July 2023 implementation.

Measurement and reporting of carbon impact across the life cycle of our homes is a crucial first step to designing out carbon—by providing real-time, data-rich feedback to designers on the impact of their decisions during the design process. It also helps meet initial compliance requirements arising from the Carbon Neutral Government Programme, the New Zealand Government Rules of Sourcing, and anticipated in future from MBIE's Building for Climate Change Programme.

#### Supporting Our Customers' Digital Literacy

Kāinga Ora is focused on supporting customers to live well in their homes and one of the ways we do this is by connecting customers to local initiatives within their own communities.

Last week, our Palmerston North Office held an afternoon tea to celebrate the graduation of customers who finished a digital training course with one of our local partners.

Recognising that many of the whānau they worked with in Palmerston North would benefit, Kāinga Ora helped 40 local customers take part in the programme. This opportunity has allowed customers to connect in a meaningful way, and opens up opportunity for them and their whanau to progress other opportunities such as online learning and accessing support services online. This has given for customers the opportunity to be more digital savvy. They are learning to do spreadsheets, PortuPoint presentations, budgets, and to connect to younger members of their whanau on social media.

Run by 20/20 Trust and facilitated locally by Highbury Whānau Centre, Family Connecties a ascart giving participants the skills and confidence needed to navigate an increasingly digital world and to help them stay connected to both whanau and community. With a focus on helping newsparticipants to access, Family Connect provides participants with a Chromebook, 12 months su since a internet connection, as well as 30 hours of digital literacy training covering everything from how to use the Google platform (including emails, sheets and docs) and Zoom through to literate security.

Feedback from our customers for the service has been incredibly positive

Dion, a Kāinga Ora customer from Roslyn said:

"Technology is advancing and everything is moving to digital series in portant to keep up," says Dion.

"I think if you are older it can be really beneficial for your monocheath and open up your world. It can get you out there so you are not stuck inside staring at for walls. There been in that position in the past and it was really difficult and isolating.

"Now I can keep up with the grandkids through social media and I have been able to access services like my GP online, which is so much easier and same sitting on the phone for ages,"

We have shared this positive initiative, which is making difference for our customers, through our website and social media channels.

#### Hamilton plan change

Kāinga Ora has made a submission to Hamilton City Council's notified intensification planning instrument – plan change 12. The principal focus of the submission addresses how Council intends to implement Te Ture Whaimana O Te Awa o Waikato - The Vision and Strategy for the Waikato River ('Te Ture Whaimana') within Plan Change 12.

The submission supports giving effect to Te Ture Whaimana, but opposes the financial contribution proposed, to be levied for the purpose of giving effect to Te Ture Whaimana. The submission notes that it appears the financial contribution would be placed in a fund that does not seek to give effect to Te Ture Whaimana. We ask that the financial contribution be deleted until a specific policy is developed to address Te Ture Whaimana. Further, the submission notes the proposed approach does not acknowledge the role that the Waikato River Authority plays in the management of the Waikato River, and the ties between that authority and local iwi through board representation.

The submission also seeks:

- deletion of the Infrastructure Capacity Overlay, with infrastructure capacity requirements instead assessed through restricted discretionary activities
- amendments to the Medium Density (MDRZ) and High Density (HDRZ) zeroes to increase enabled development through additional heights
- changes consistent with the Kāinga Ora submission on plan change 9, which opposed the approach of establishing historic heritage areas

Kāinga Ora engaged with Waikato Tainui and the Ministry of Urasir) and Urban Development (HUD) and their feedback informed, in part, the Kāinga Ora subression. We note the submission points in regard to the infrastructure overlay are also consistent with the draft HUD submission to plan change 12.

## Early plans for new homes in Central Whakatane with the benefit of urban development outcomes

Kāinga Ora plans to build approximately 50 houses and apartments in central Whakatane. A commercial building at 110 King Street is currently being demolished and, where possible, deconstructed so that build approximaterials can be reused. This is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Design is in progress, but yet to be finalised. Early plans suggest a mix of single level homes, three storey apartments and some street level commercial space will be built. The original plan was to build a three storey builting on the site. However, when considering the need for higher ground floor levels to meet be detrict plan flood management considerations, and the fact that the development is in a commercial part of the city, other options are being considered. This includes building to four stories with number of new homes to be provided. First preference for any commercial or office space built would be to accommodate social or health service providers. This would provide Whakatane with a good urban development outcome.

The team working on the project aim to lodge Resource Consent early in 2023 and Building Consent around mid-2023. Before then Kāinga Ora will be connecting with the Whakatane community to share plans and seek feedback.

#### Six metre Totara tree transplanted

Last week a six metre Totara tree identified for removal from a development site in Owairaka Development was transplanted to a new home in Mangere East Primary School. The Mangere Large Scale Project is a demonstration of the Kāinga Ora Ngahere Project to increase tree canopy in an area with only 8 percent coverage. Mangere East Primary is part of the Kāinga Ora 'Tiny Forest in School initiative which is being delivered in partnership with a local community organisation, ME Family Services, a kaupapa Māori consultancy Uru Whakaaro and six Mangere Schools to increase tree canopy in Mangere.

The tree was lifted up with a special tree spade, hoisted up to a truck, and relocated by Aaron Contractors. Kāinga Ora staff joined Mangere East Primary School to welcome the tree with reaction and waiata led by the children.

Kāinga Ora is also planning to deliver a Puka tree to Waterlea School and a Nikau to Te a a tata stream. These, and other trees, have been taken from Owairaka development sites. We servect to transplant other native trees in the future from Owairaka and possibly Oranga sites.

#### First Home Partner milescole - 100 homes purchased in the first year

The first 100 homes have user ourchased through the First Home Partner scheme, supporting individuals and whatau troughout the country with their home ownership journey. This milestone aligns with the scheme scheme scheme anniversary this month (October).

As at 30 September 2022:

- 102 nomes have been purchased through the First Home Partner scheme and are located in Aukland, Wellington, Waikato, Tauranga, Manawatu-Whanganui, Gisborne, Selwyn and Christchurch
- a applicants have signed Sale and Purchase Agreements they are just awaiting settlement date, finance or council documents.

There is an opportunity to proactively announce this milestone during the month of October 2022, with the potential to include stories of one or two buyers who have achieved home ownership through the scheme.

#### When help with a lawn mower provides a breakthrough

Sometimes we have customers who, due to personal challenges, struggle to live well in their home and also refuse access to their property. In these situations we need to try a wide range of approaches to achieve a breakthrough.

We recently had one of these cases in South Auckland where the step forward ended up being help with a lawn mower. Senior Housing Support Manager, Finau Lauaki, managed to gain access to a home where the household had rejected multiple earlier offers of assistance. In this situation the customer explained that he and his wife had been unwell and the reason they had refused to engage earlier was because they were embarrassed at how they were living in their home and felt overwhelmed. Finau emphasised no judgement and a commitment to help. He rapidly coordinated a group of people including from the Healthy Homes programme team and the maintenance team to clean-up, repair and upgrade the property.

Alongside this, social support referrals were made for the couple to the Ratavine community house and Manurewa marae. The couple moved into temporary accommodation while their time was being worked on. Our local housing support team helped fill skip bins of items from the home and when work was complete the property had a new oven, cupboards, benches and a brandump. The couple were welcomed back to their home. Along with being delighted with their new fiving environment they have been cooking, cleaning and welcoming visitors again.

#### Central Ne son site secured for housing

We have one unconditional on the purchase of a 3000 m<sup>2</sup> central site at 107 Nile Street in Nelson, with settlement on 12 October 2022.

The site's close proximity to schools, shops and amenities make it an ideal location for family homes. We will consider options for between 15 and 25 homes on the site, before a final design is developed.

After settlement, the local team will engage with key stakeholders and we will issue a media release to let the community know Kāinga Ora has purchased the site to build new warm, dry homes.

#### New office opens in Christchurch

A new Kāinga Ora office opened this week in Ōtautahi - Christchurch.

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The space at 14 Show Place, in the suburb of Addington, will be home for just over 100 non-customer facing staff. Customer-facing teams and a small number of non customer-facing staff will remain at our existing Moorhouse and Papanui offices.

Teams operating in the new space include Construction and Innovation, Investment and Planning, National Services, People, Governance and Capability, Te Kurutao, and Commercial who will work in a series of 'communities' across the space.

Space has also been set up in the office for a Christchurch-based Customer Support Centreman vill accommodate up to 30 staff from next year.
